Narendra Modi Government Faces Numerous Tough Challenges

ith the formation of the 18th Lok Sabha and the new NDA government under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and its allies are now facing several significant challenges.

These include the election of the Deputy Speaker in the Lok Sabha, by-elections for the Lok Sabha and various state assemblies, assembly elections in states like Haryana and Maharashtra, the election of the BJP's national president, maintaining close relations with the Rashtriva Swavamsevak Sangh (RSS), changes in state organizations, and the appointment of governors in several states

Changes in State Presidents

Next month, the BJP is expected to change its state presidents in several states. Among those expected to be replaced is Rajasthan's state president, MPC.P. Joshi. Other states where changes are anticipated include Bihar, Kerala, Andaman and Nicobar Islands, Gujarat, Haryana, Delhi, and some North-Eastern states. In addition, some states might see changes in their incharges and organization ministers.

The in-charges of Raiasthan, Harvana, and Delhi are likely to remain the same. Raiasthan's state in-charge. Vinay Sahasrabuddhe, and Haryana's in-charge, Satish Poonia, are expected to retain their positions due to the upcoming assembly elections in these states. According to

media reports. the BJP may change the state presidents in about eight states next month. Given the good results in the Delhi Lok Sabha elections, the BJP is unlikely to replace its in-charge, Om Prakash Dhankhar.

Strategizing for By-elections Strategizing for by-elec-

tions for the vacant Lok Sabha seats, due to members being elected as MLAs or winning from multiple seats and resigning from one, is also a crucial task, with high-level preparations underway.

Appointment of Governors

Prime Minister Narendra Modi also faces the challenge of appointing or extending the terms of governors in some states. The terms of several gov-

ernors, including Kalraj Mishra

of Rajasthan. Acharva Devvrat of Gujarat, Anandiben Patel of Uttar Pradesh, and Fagu Singh Chauhan of Bihar, are ending this year. The terms of Anusuiya of Chhattisgarh and Biswa Bhushan Harichandan of Andhra Pradesh are also ending. Additionally, the terms of Kerala's Arif Mohammad Khan and Telangana's Tamilisai Soundararajan will expire in September.

Rajasthan Assembly Byelections

In Rajasthan, by-elections will be held for the assembly seats vacated by five MLAs who became MPs. Winning these by-elections is a matter of prestige for both the BJP and the opposition.It will be interesting to see how the Narendra Modigovernment and the BJP tackle these numerous tough challenges in the coming days. - Gopendra Nath Bhatt

Lieutenant General Manjinder Singh Assumes Command of South Western Command

Lieutenant General Manjinder Singh took over the reins of the Jaipur-based Sapta Shakti Command on 01 July 2024 in a solemn ceremony at the Prena Sthal, Jaipur Military Station, where he paid tribute to the Bravehearts.



Lieutenant General Manjinder Singh is an alumnus of the National Defence Academy, Khadakwasla, and the Indian Military Academy, Dehradun. He was commissioned into the 19 MADRAS in December 1986. In his distinguished and illustrious military career spanning 37 years, he has held important and challenging command

and staff appointments in Jammu & Kashmir and on the Western Front. The General Officer commanded his Battalion in an intense Counter Insurgency environment in Jammu & Kashmir, an Infantry Brigade at the Line of Control, an Infantry Division as part of Desert Strike Corps, and a Corps deployed along the Line of Control in Counter Insurgency Operations in Jammu & Kashmir.

His varied staff appointments include Col GS (IW) in a Corps deployed in an intense Counter Insurgency environment in Jammu & Kashmir and Col GS (Ops/Air), BGS (Ops), MGGS (Ops), and COS in Command HQs. His instructional appointments include Platoon Commander & Instructor Class C at the Indian Military Academy and DS Coord at the Indian Military Training Team (IMTRAT), Bhutan. For his exemplary leadership and devotion to duty towards the nation, the General Officer was decorated with the Yudh Seva Medal in 2015, the Vishisht Seva Medal in 2019, and the Ati Vishisht Seva Medal in 2024.

The General Officer has been the Colonel of the Madras Regiment since 01 January 2021. He served as the Deputy Chief of Integrated Defence Staff (Policy, Planning & Force Development) till 30 November 2022 and took over as the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief of Army Training Command on 01 December 2023.

Urban Pollution Threatens Water Resources During **Rainy Season**

Udaipur: With the onset of the rainy season, the infiltration of urban waste and pollution into water sources has emerged as a critical issue, posing severe threats to surface water resources. This pressing concern was the main focus during the Lake Dialogue held in Udaipur on Sunday.

He mentioned that the Raiasthan government operates on a zero-tolerance policy towards crime. On Monday, Mr. Sharma held a high-level meeting with the Home Department to disseminate the new criminal

The new criminal laws use gender-neutral terms to promote gender equality and terms like intellectual disabil**Provisions for Timely** Mr. Sharma pointed out

that the new criminal laws have defined time limits for critical stages of criminal cases. Provisions include informing the complainant of case progress within 90 days, completing preliminary investigations within 14 days, providing medical reports in rape cases within 7 days, framing charges within 60 days of the first hearing, and delivering verdicts within 45 days of trial completion, ensuring swift justice for victims. The new laws also include provisions like community service for minor offenses, e-challans, e-summons, defining mob lynching, audiovideo recording, replacing the legal provision of sedition with
